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# RESPECTING PATIENTS' NEEDS WITH ULTRASOUND USE IN SPORTS MEDICINE



Dr. David Harsha is board-certified in musculoskeletal ultrasound and has utilized the technology for over a decade. Ultrasound imaging is less expensive than an MRI and can sometimes be used as an alternative option to view suspected stress fractures not visible with an MRI test.

Ultrasounds are a common prenatal test for many expecting mothers. At Hendricks Regional Health, this same technology is being used to capture an in-depth look at sports-related injuries.

Dr. David Harsha, MD, CAQSM, FAAFP, RMSK, of Hendricks Orthopedics and Sports Medicine recently became board certified in Musculoskeletal Ultrasonography. He uses the ultrasound machine up to ten times a day to diagnose and treat injuries, whether he's working with patients in his office or with athletes on the sidelines and in training rooms.

According to Dr. Harsha, ultrasound brings with it a number of benefits. "Using ultrasound reduces the risk of bleeding and nerve injuries," Harsha explained. looking directly at the tissue involved.

"For example, we can use this tool to ensure an injection goes directly into a joint without hitting nerves and blood vessels."

The cost of this technology is also another huge benefit. "The use of ultrasound to treat sport injuries is becoming more popular in the United States because it's less expensive than an MRI and can often provide us with the same information," said Dr. Harsha.

HRH patients with hematomas, Baker's cysts, tennis or golf elbow, carpal tunnel or just aches and pains in their joints or ligaments can potentially benefit from the use of musculoskeletal ultrasound. Dr. Harsha relies on the machine whenever he suspects, but needs to verify, an injury by

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#### CARDIAC REHAB ENGAGES & EMPOWERS HEART PATIENTS



Cardiac rehabilitation helps patients recover and build strength to get their hearts back to good health.

This year marks the 30th anniversary of cardiac rehabilitation at Hendricks Regional Health. "It's incredible how much the program has grown," said Kevin Speer, HRH President and CEO. "What started in a small hospital room with a treadmill and stationary bike is now offered at our Brownsburg and Danville hospitals and the HRH Avon YMCA."

Those who participate in cardiac rehabilitation "I've been here for 13 years and have heard have experienced events and conditions such as a heart attack, heart failure, stable angina, cardiomyopathy, heart transplant and more. "Attending cardiac rehab for these patients is as important as undergoing physical therapy after hip surgery," added Jan Hesler, RN, Cardiac Rehab Clinical Manager.

During the 12-week rehab program, participants are given a personalized exercise prescription and provided with nutritional quidance, medication management and further instructions for activity. "The education and knowledge provided to patients equips them with the skills they need to safely exercise in any facility or gym," said Jo Ann Morton, Director of Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehabilitation and Intensive Care Unit.

Exercise Physiologist Amy Larkin supports cardiac rehab patients by providing education as well as monitoring their heart rhythm, heart rate and blood pressure while exercising. "I love watching the progress of our patients, and helping them relax and enjoy themselves while they are here. It's amazing to see the relationships and sense of community that develops."

many great stories," Amy continued. "Most stories are about patients starting out debilitated and very weak. By the end of the program, they feel great. One patient with a low ejection fraction was able to get back to normal because of cardiac rehab and had to be discharged early."

In addition to education and exercise support, a vital tool in each patient's emotional recovery after a cardiac event is the support and camaraderie shared by other patients. As they exercise together, they swap experiences and concerns, and help each other along the path of healing.

"Most patients see a huge difference from the beginning to the end of the program," explained Amy. "It helps strengthen their heart; they become more educated about their situation and new lifestyle; it helps with depression; and they like the social aspect that comes out of it. Our patients notice how much we care about them and what we do."
