



When you're seeking quick care, sometimes it can be difficult to determine where you should go. Take a look below at the symptoms and conditions that typically result in a trip to one of these locations. **If you are experiencing a life-threatening situation at any time, dial 9-1-1 immediately.**

## Primary Care



See your primary provider for your physical yearly. Your primary care provider will also help you care for your chronic medical problems. Call to schedule appointments for your acute illness needs. Call the after-hours line for emergency guidance on health needs if the office is closed.

- Checkups or physicals
- Common illnesses such as cold/flu, sore throat, rash
- Vaccines and Flu shots
- Health advice
- Medication refill/questions
- Referral to a specialist
- Routine tests
- Chronic aches and pain
- Urinary pain
- Nausea or diarrhea
- Minor pain, sprains, or swelling, but still able to move or walk
- Minor burns, cuts, lacerations, or bites

## Immediate or Urgent Care



If your primary care provider is not available, and urgent evaluation is needed, go to immediate care for the following:

*\*Infants under the age of 3 months cannot be seen in the Immediate Care Centers\**

- Colds, cough, flu, sore throat, COVID
- Vomiting or diarrhea
- Ear pain/pressure/infection
- Mild headache
- Treatment of minor allergic reactions (skin reactions)
- Urinary pain or infections
- Moderate pain, sprains, or swelling, but still able to move or walk
- Moderate burns, cuts, lacerations, or bites
- Vaginal discharge or penile discharge; concern for STD
- Minor rashes
- Skin infections/Boils/Skin abscesses
- Sports Physicals

## Emergency Department



Go to the Emergency Department for serious threatening conditions.

- Chest pain
- Broken bone
- High Fever
- Fever in an infant <90 days old
- Difficulty speaking
- Dizziness
- New shortness of breath
- Signs of stroke such as:
  - Dizziness, sudden vision changes, face drooping, numbness in arm, slurred speech, or trouble speaking
- Serious head injury or eye injury
- Sudden loss of consciousness
- Accidental ingestion of foreign substance or object
- Severe pain, swelling or immobility in joint or muscle
- Trouble breathing
- Uncontrolled bleeding
- Seizure
- Sudden, severe headache
- Severe allergic reaction or attack
- Severe abdominal pain
- Vaginal bleeding in pregnancy
- Head injuries
